

**Perrott Hill**  
**EAL with International Pupil Support Policy**  
**(English as an Additional Language)**



**Day-to-day responsibility for the governance of the school lies with the Board of Governors whilst the Chair of the Board of Directors holds ultimate responsibility.**

### **Introduction**

Perrott Hill is committed to the development of each individual pupil. International pupils enrich our school community through the diversity of culture and experience that they bring. In providing for international pupils for whom English is an additional language, the school has to balance the needs of the individual against those of the whole community. International pupils who attend the school will need to be able to access the academic curriculum and work independently; some of these pupils will receive extra support (additional provision is detailed in the EAL with International Pupil Support Department Handbook).

### **Purpose**

The purpose of this policy is to ensure that international pupils and prospective international pupils are not treated less favourably than others. It sets out the steps that the school takes to ensure that they receive appropriate support to ensure that they are able to benefit fully from their education here at Perrott Hill.

### **Admissions Standards**

International pupils for whom English is an additional language will have a Skype interview with the EAL teacher, Head of Boarding and the Headmaster prior to admission. Applicants must supply, amongst other information, a report from their present school.

Admission is based on our expectation that pupils should be capable of managing the prescribed syllabus if they study here at Perrott Hill.

### **Specific Aims for International Students**

In addition to the school's aims for all its pupils, we set out to create an environment in which our international pupils can:

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- Improve their English language in order to enable them to make progress in their other subjects;
- Gain an internationally recognised English language qualification where appropriate;
- Gain an understanding of English culture and heritage.

### **Provision for International Pupils**

Whilst Perrott Hill remains a British school, we acknowledge that for international pupils to gain the very best from the opportunities the school offers, we must ensure these opportunities are easily available to international pupils.

### **International Pupil Induction**

During the holidays prior to the pupils arriving in England, the Head of Boarding in liaison with the Admissions Registrar send the families various booklets including the Boarding Handbook, UK Guardians and EAL.

International pupils who are new to the school are invited to arrive at the school the day before term begins. This enables them to meet some of their teachers, the boarding house staff and boarding matron and to be shown around the school. During the course of the term, specifically assigned mentors and Boarding Captains will help them to orientate themselves around the school and grounds. The school rules are explained and the fire drill is walked through, so that all pupils know what is expected of them. Uniform will also be fitted and named. There is an on-going boarding programme for part-time and full-time boarders which will ensure that the pupils experience a wide range of British culture and heritage. This will be complemented by learning in EAL, year group outings and trips throughout the year.

### **English Language Assessment**

The EAL teacher will use the Oxford placement test to initially assess the language ability of pupils within the first two weeks of joining the school. All international pupils will receive EAL support as their need dictates. The frequency of this help is decided by the EAL teacher in conjunction with the Director of Studies, the relevant Heads of Departments and subject teachers. On-going teacher assessment will dictate any changes in provision.

### **EAL Teaching**

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The EAL teacher provides specific EAL lessons for international pupils for whom English is an additional language. Classes are small (typically no more than 4 pupils) and some sessions may involve one-to-one tuition. There is a dedicated EAL tutor room which is both inviting and welcoming to all international pupils, regardless of whether they have EAL lessons or not.

The curriculum for the international pupils aims:

- To provide experience of UK teaching styles and classroom dynamics;
- To enhance their English skills;
- To develop relevant academic vocabulary;
- To attain Cambridge ESOL levels, as and when appropriate;
- To enhance international understanding, intercultural links and experience first-hand aspects of British life, culture and customs;
- To instil confidence;
- To have, above all, an enjoyable experience.

### **EAL Support in Lessons**

Non-specialist teachers will provide for international pupils in their teaching, either by use of differentiated material, glossaries of technical words or individual attention. The EAL teacher will support staff to develop appropriate resources and teaching materials to enhance the linguistic skills and conceptual understanding of EAL learners. The EAL teacher may offer in-class support as and when needed or requested.

In the Foundation Stage, children have the opportunity to play in their home languages during the course of the week with support from specialist language teachers.

### **EAL Support for Additional Work**

All pupils may ask for support with any additional work from the staff on duty in the boarding houses. The staff are trained teachers who will know the pupils well and also be familiar with the curriculum. Every teacher is aware they have a responsibility to language development of all EAL learners.

### **Extra-curricular Opportunities**

We are an English country preparatory school and, as such, offer many English sports such as rugby, cricket, hockey, netball, tennis and rounders. We recognise that many international pupils may not have played these sports and may have different interests. However, in order to meet our aim of exposing the international pupils to

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British culture and heritage, we do ask them to participate fully in our extra-curricular programme.

Pupils also have the opportunity to comment on meals via the children's Food Committee, chaired by the Headmaster's wife and the Head Chef.

### **Cultural Opportunities**

International full boarders are regularly invited to spend a weekend with a school friend. For exeat weekends the full boarders' parents will arrange for their child to spend the weekend with the designated UK-based guardian. However, if day pupils invite the full boarders to their homes, the Head of Boarding will ensure that both sets of parents have exchanged contact details and that satisfactory arrangements have been made.

### **Parents' visits and international communications**

Parents and guardians of international pupils are able to visit the school at any stage and are made most welcome. If sufficient notice is given, they are able to meet and talk to their child's teachers when they visit. They are also most welcome to attend the relevant parent-teacher consultations and telephone or Skype parent consultations will also be offered with the EAL teacher.

The EAL teacher, Form Tutors, Head of Boarding and Admissions Registrar, in particular, are in regular contact with the parents of the international pupils. This communication can reassure both parents and children. The policy of pupils not contacting home in the first week may appear harsh but it is evident that it does help the children to integrate fully into the life of the school. Parents are amenable with this arrangement. The Head of Boarding is in regular contact with the parents in these first few days. At the end of the first week there will be a Skype consultation for the parents with the Head of Boarding and the EAL teacher.

After the first week when telephone calls are restricted, international pupils call home at least twice a week (Sunday for a long call, midweek for a midweek chat) and often more frequently. Perrott Hill email accounts are created for international boarders to use freely during evenings in the boarding houses.

### **The Future**

While it is recognised that the vast majority of international pupils will wish to return home at (or before) the end of Year 8, some will wish to transfer to a UK senior independent school. Our curriculum is designed to ease this transfer provided that the pupil has the ability to succeed in the Common Entrance Examinations. A decision about this will need to be made at the latest by the end of December of Year

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8 in order for provision to be put in place for examinations the following June. The Headmaster and the Director of Studies, in liaison with the EAL teacher, will give parents informed guidance regarding an appropriate UK senior school.

This policy should be read in conjunction with the Boarding Handbook and the EAL with International Pupil Support Department Handbook.
